The regular meeting will be on the 4th Saturday May 22 [NOT the usual 3rd], May 22, and will feature the newest investment by Bill Gautsch, a Bandsaw Mill. We will be making bowl blanks from logs and selling them for a very modest price. Meeting will be at B&B Studios in Onalaska

June 19 At the Falch Studio in Winona, we'll be learning about various remounting methods as well as vacuum chucking. I have been assured that this meeting will really suck.

July 17 Tool day. What would you like this year? We aren't going to be quite so ambitious this year, but we will still be doing grinding and heat treating. Get those requests in early if you feel you have a need for some low-cost tooling.


