

Use of Color To Enhance Woodturnings

Duane Hill will be doing the demo at the January meeting. He will be presenting the use of dyes to enhance woodturnings. Duane will go over the process he picked up from Phil Irons, Kirk Deheer and Lane Phillips to apply dyes to turnings to enhance the grain and give a totally different look to the turning. Duane will cover alcohol vs water based dyes, application, use of resists and overall dyeing techniques. There will be lots of coloring, examples and sanding. Little to no turning will be done.

I have been woodworking since my freshman year in High School. I was fortunate to have a great teacher at that time that set a life long love of working with wood. I have also taken some woodworking classes at WTC here in La Crosse and I have a wife that is a better flat woodworker than I am. In High School I always enjoyed turning on the lathe but it was done mostly with a tracer attachment, we did not learn to use many of the lathe hand tools. I have made some cabinets and furniture but I did not start turning until a few years ago when I attended an A-Line Machine tool demonstration and watched Duane Hill perform some of his magic. He was turning a bowl and I thought I could do that! So I

setup my Shopsmith into a lathe and attempted to turn a bowl using a faceplate to hold a small log. I tried cutting into the end grain. The piece came flying off the faceplate and did a 1 ½ somersault in the air and landing on the machines braces, I did this twice. After that, I called Duane Hill and he explained what I needed and then I joined CRW.

I would say most of my turning knowledge has come from members of our group and attending some of the professional classes offered through our club and some other locations. I would consider myself an intermediate turner with much learning to do.

I have two lathes, Delta Iron Bed and a Jet Mini, but not any of the really good brands and not much space to do my work. I would like to build a shop some time in the future but building ordinances and land layout have prevented my most recent attempts. I have found that the most important equipment of turning is to have sharp tools and the sharpening equipment.

I have other hobbies and most of them involve a gun, hunting, trapshooting, and some fishing.


Remember to turn safely.
