BY-LAWS

At the December meeting, some discussion took place regarding the By-Laws. At question was some language in Article III regarding safety. The question was brought to the AAW offices, and they approved our language change. Also mentioned was the wording in Article V regarding professional demonstrations. The Officers made changes to accommodate the discussion. The By-Laws were approved at the meeting pending the changes. Rather than reprint the By-Laws in their entirety, below are the paragraphs containing the changes.

ARTICLE III

(last paragraph - change in bold and italics) -

The national office strongly recommends placing some sort of sign or notice on or around any lathe used for demonstration; that safety eye protection must be worn and a full face shield when needed. *Use of a dust mask and wearing hearing protection is recommended*. The lathe is a potentially dangerous instrument only to be used with Chapter approved supervision.

ARTICLE V

Annual membership fees for this Chapter (over and above fees paid to the national organization) will be \$35.00 per person. Family members of a fully paid member may join for an additional \$15 each per year. The membership fee covers a minimum of 10 meetings per year. When scheduling permits, professional demonstrations will be provided for 2 meetings per year at an additional cost. When funds are available and scheduling permits, the club will sponsor a professional demonstration at no extra cost to the members.

Hi Guys, I am sending you a safety note for the newsletter. The piece of wood you see in the photos flew off the piece of Cedar I was turning and hit me square in the face shield I was wearing. I normally wear just safety glasses with side shields. Because of the Cedar dust problem (It's fine and smells) I was wearing my Trend filtering safety hood and I'm glad I did. Half way through the inside bowl cut it came loose and hit the shield with a bang. I was turning at about 1800 RPM. If I only had my safety glasses on, it would have hit me square in the face. If it hit on the edge, I would be having reconstructive face surgery and or might not have my eyes. We need to talk more about safety and practice it better. During demonstrations we need to practice what we preach to show by example what others should do when turning. L was lucky in this case.

Tip of the Month:

At the request of several members from the December meeting here are a few rules of thumb to follow when turning: 1). For turning an item in spindle orientation (grain running parallel to lathe bed), always turn from largest diameter to smallest 2). For hollowing end grain, hollow from the center towards the outside 3). For turning outside in cross grain orientation (grain running perpendicular to lathe bed), turn from smallest diameter to largest (outside of bowl) 4). For turning the inside of a bowl in cross grain configuration, turn from the largest to smallest diameter 5). safe lathe speed - Diameter (in inches) x RPM should be between 6000 and 9000, ie 10" diameter bowl should be turned between 600 and 900 rpm. 600 or slower for roughing. No higher than 900 for finishing.

Jan 2009 - Lathe fundamentals 101. Your chance to cast off all those bad habits and start the new year off right. We plan to have three or more mini-lathe stations, with some of our more seasoned/experienced members acting as mentors, giving hands-on instruction on some of the basics of tool presentation in spin-

dle and faceplate work. Bring your questions, your worst problem tool and some safety gear.

Feb 2009 - Off-center/Multi-axis turning. Rich Egan will demonstrate some of the techniques he has learned making multi-axis candlesticks.


March 2009 - Mike Hunter, inventor of the Hunter Tool. Mike will demonstrate the features of his various tool designs.





