Woodcutting Adventure at Lee Sage's

Tuesday April 24th, 2012 the following (See Below) met with Jim Frank to go to Lee Sage's Farm East of Coon Valley to cut wood for the members of CRW. We met at 9:30 am and proceeded to Lee's farm. Using Lee's tractor and trailer, we drove to the wood lot and choose the following trees to cut: Cherry, oak, Hickory, Maple and some other species. We had 3 teams of two each working with 3 chain saws. After cutting + 100 varying diameter pieces of wood, we anchor sealed the ends. Due to the weight, 1/2 of the wood we cut will be available for the June CRW meeting. Lee was not able to attend the April meeting so we postponed bringing the wood for a month. 1/2 of the trailer of wood is still at Lee's cabin for later club purchase. The cost to the members will be \$3.00 for one piece and \$5.00 for two.

Michael Mocho Demonstration

Jim Frank and I went up to Minneapolis to watch an all day demo put on by Michael Mocho. The demo was sponsored by the Minnesota Woodturners. The demo was well attended, with approximately 50 people there.

Michael Mocho is from Albuquerque, New Mexico. He specializes in small items, especially decorating these items. He uses chatter work, spirals and abrasive shaping to decorate his pieces. He also does a lot with the skew and thread chasing. Check out his website at www.mmocho.com to see some of his work.

Michael started off the demo showing some skew work and then turning a three part top. He drilled the body out and then turned a slender spindle and tip. The spindle and tip were turned with a tenon to fit the drilled hole. He showed a technique of how to fit the tenon without doing any measurements. He used a metal drill sizing gage to help size and cut the tenons. While turning the body, he decorated it with some chatter work. Michael does not use a chatter tool to do his chatter work. Instead he uses either a small skew or detail gouge. He backs the tool rest away from the piece, lowers the rest below center and uses the lathe speed to help control the chatter. This type of chatter works best on the end grain of hard wood. He was using hard maple for all of his turnings in the demo.



During the demo, Michael showed how to do chatter work with a skew and spindle gouge; how to do spirals with the Sorby Spiraling Tool; thread chasing on hard maple with a special "solution" and making a box with a spiraled inlay set into the bottom.

All in all, the demo was very informative and interesting. I would recommend going to see Michael if you get the chance. The box of small items could also act as an inspiration for the small walnut challenge coming up in June.
