In the future we will endeavor to include a photo of a piece for each person who brought in work. Sorry to those who have been overlooked in the past.



There was some discussion recently on crw-talk about shop dust collection and shop safety. Here's this reply from Jim Cox.

If I can give my two cents worth about workshops, and safety, You have two ears, plug them up, you have two eyes, get some safety glasses on. You have ten fingers, use a push stick or buy a saw stop. But your lungs are something that runs your whole body, you can live without the rest of the things, but your breathing is something you should invest in. Menards sells a smaller barrel type dust/air cleaner, they are yellow and I have one along with another air cleaner. The unit sells for about \$130.00 and it sucks some air particles pretty good enough for a small shop. You can use the dust mask along with this to help clean the air out of the shop. The smaller particles is what will really hurt you and they can just sit inside of your lungs, making it harder to breath every day. If you are planning on doing any amount of work in the shop in the future, make a little investment with your shop and try to keep the air clean. The mask will help and check to see how much of the smaller particles it catches though. If you are working with MDF, these particles contain formaldehyde and this is really bad for anyone to be breathing also.

Brother Finbar McMullen didn't like the fact that he couldn't roll over in a zipped-up sleeping bag when he was winter camping. So he designed a hood to solve the problem. "I didn't set out to make this," he said. "But it solved a problem for me."

A new exhibit at Saint Mary's University Lillian Davis Hogan Galleries is filled with McMullen's solutions to life's problems, along with photographs he has taken and carvings he has made over the decades. Titled "The Eye & Hand of the Craftsman – The life work of Finbar McMullen, FSC," the exhibit runs through Aug. 19. It also celebrates McMullen's 70th year as a Christian Brother. McMullen started at Saint Mary's University in 1967, retiring in 2000. He spent many of those years working in the science shop coming up with interesting solutions to problems, many of which are on display. On one wall is a gun that shoots nets, which McMullen built for the biology department to allow students and faculty to band waterfowl. The gun used three chambers firing .22-caliber rounds to launch canvas dummies attached to the net.

"My job was to make the gun and make sure the three dummies go at the same time," McMullen said.

McMullen's sleeping hoods have made it to both of the world's poles. Ann Bancroft used one on her 1986 North Pole expedition, McMullen said, and he made a special set of hoods for a group that visited the South Pole.

McMullen takes a lot of pride in his inventions, but takes the most pleasure in his wood carvings. The exhibit showcases coffee mugs, canes, bowls and utensils he has made for himself and for others.

"There is something about working with your hands that generates peace," he said. "It is just part of our nature to do things with our hands."






Next Meeting Onalaska Community Center Saturday, July 21, 2012 at 9 am.
