Start Your Christmas Shopping

Craft Supplies Order – We will again have a club Craft Supplies order this year. The goal is to have the order delivered in time for the December meeting. That way, Santa can be good to you with tools and such and you can have them for Christmas. In order to do this, all orders need to brought to the November meeting. If you will not be at the November meeting, you can e-mail your order to Duane Hill (wisawdust@charter.net) or drop them off at his house (808 Quincy in Onalaska). All orders need to be in by the November meeting. On your order, make sure you have your name, address, phone number and e-mail address. Also, for each item ordered, we need the item number, quantity ordered, a description of the item (it helps if you use the description from the Craft Supplies catalog), the page number from the catalog and the price. I know this sounds like a lot of information, but it really helps when putting together the order. As in the past, no money is required up front. You will be contacted with your discounted total. You will need to pay before you receive your order. We need at least \$1000 to get 10% off. After that, the more we order, the greater the discount. We will also get free shipping. We have typically received a 12-15% discount on our orders

A Visit to the Stevenson Ranch

Steve and Carol Stevenson

I guess it was meant to be seeing as we'll celebrate 41 years in December. We lived in Bartlett, Illinois for 32 years. Steve owned an industrial flooring business which he started in 1963 until he retired in 2008. Carol had a commercial interior plant design firm until she retired in 1996. That's when we built our home here on the farm and Carol moved to Wisconsin.

We purchased our 240 acre farm in 1989. It took an hour to make that decision. We have planted over 60,000 white pine, white oak, red oak and black walnut trees. The oaks are all protected by tree shelters.

In 1990 we built our first concrete/steel building which houses the Town of Stevenson museum and Carol's studio as well as farm equipment and a Wood-Mizer sawmill. Our wood working shop is located in another adjacent building. We have processed dozens of western cedar utility poles which one will find in the museum. The entire museum was completed by us with the exception of a stone fireplace.

We both have many hobbies. Carol does oil painting, carving, porcelain doll making, sign making, jewelry, restoration of furniture, embroidery and crocheting, gardening, collecting vintage hats and now turning pens. Steve works in the tree fields, enjoys gardening, photography, and reading and loves our museum projects as well as working in the wood shop.

While we were in attendance of the Norskedalen event this fall we met Jim Frank and Duane Hill. Carol became fascinated with how beautiful their projects were. She just couldn't leave that area and soon was hooked on turning. We joined the club and found so many wonderful new friends. Carol turned her first pen last week while Steve worked on his first plate. One thing is for sure. You don't learn this overnight.
