I seldom change chuck jaws as I have several chucks, When I went to remove some existing jaws from a chuck to install them, I found the screws to one of the jaws were loose, enough that I could wiggle the jaw a little. I wondered how long they had been that way, and what it had been doing to my chuck precision and safety. I went through all the jaws on all of my chucks and found they were all snug. That one jaw was the only anomaly. Probably a good idea to check jaw tightness from time to time if you have several chucks like I do and seldom change jaws.

#### FOUND IN THE WOOD CHIPS UNDER MY LATHE - from John Griffiths

Hello members, here is my monthly ramble through the CRW happenings.

First off, Earth Fair: Thanks to everyone who played a part however small, at making it work. A lot of work and heavy lifting was required. And not in the most pleasant weather one could hope for. Our thanks especially to Pam Day for all she did and her ideas to make it work. Next time you see her, be sure to personally thank her.

Secondly, remember that in May we will have a Skew Challenge. That means bring in a piece or more made with a skew from rough out to the final pass with a tool. So, whether you can drive a Devil's Can Opener well already or you need a bit of practice with it, make something from the start with the skew or skews and bring it along for the Instant Gallery. (Hints: easy to rough out a spindle piece with a skew. For this a big one works better then a smaller one.) Also we all know all wood turning tools work their best when scary sharp, but the skew is less tolerant of dullness then most other tools. So don't be afraid to frequently grind them and give a careful honing when needed. Lastly, don't make my common mistake: finishing your cut and lifting your skew off the work to admire your cut and immediately dropping the toe of the skew down into the spinning work, resulting in a big catch. Yup, guilty as charged, over and over. You would think I'd learn sometime or other.)

Third, For the May Demonstration, I will be demonstrating Wig Stands. These are not rocket science but require both some spindle turning and bowl turning techniques so a way to keep current on both aspects of turning. And please bring in a stand or three for our cause.

There are basically two types of box lids. Some lids fit loosely on the box so that they are easily removed with one hand, while other lids fit tightly and require that the box be held in one hand while removing the lid with the other. Loose lid boxes are containers that often sit on a horizontal surface, like a dresser or counter top, and hold objects or ingredients that can be easily accessed (**Figures 1, 2**). A tight lid secures the box's contents for small loose items; a pill box, for example, should have a Type 3 lid (**Figure 3**). Boxes with Type 3 lids can also be filled to the top and still have the top close completely.

#### Making Type 1 & 2 lids

Loose lids are the easiest to fit. Starting with the box itself, turn the inside edge so that it is straight and parallel to the lathe bed. I use a 1/2" (13mm) skew on its side to make a straight cut down the inside wall (**photo below, right**). When the box is hollowed to the desired depth, sand the inside and apply a finish.

It is easy to over-sand the interior rim or the edge of the lid that will meet the box. In many species, the difference in sidegrain and endgrain density leads to disproportionately removing material from two sides of the blank, creating an oval form and a poor-fitting lid.







**Figures 1, 2, 3.** Loose lids generally have a short tenon that fits into the opening of the box, either protruding above the sides of the box (Type 1, **left**), or flush with the box sides (Type 2, **center**). Although Type 1 and Type 2 boxes can be made with tight lids, it is more common to see Type 3 (**right**) boxes with a lid that fits snugly so that it can be carried around without falling open.



Cut the box's walls parallel with a flat–end scraper so that the lid will fit properly.

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
